Strengthening Families in **Your** Community

United Way of East Central Iowa (UWECI) works with 31 local nonprofits to improve our community. Area Substance Abuse Council (ASAC) is one of these funded partners. Programs include substance abuse counseling on a variety of levels, as well as residential and outpatient services to both youth and adults.

From the Heart

One specific example is ASAC's Heart of Iowa, which serves nearly 150 families every year. The residential program and halfway house supports women who have children or are pregnant at the time they come in for recovery. Wanda Sellers is ASAC Heart of Iowa's director.

"These women want to get help, but don't want to be in a position where they have to put their children into foster care while they're in residential services. **They want to rebuild their families and their lives.**"





A Life Rebuilt with Your Support

Lindsay describes her childhood as relatively normal. She was a very happy child and grew up to be a cheerleader, a high school graduate, and an active member of her community.

When she started using drugs seven years ago, she didn't know how much her life would change. "I had no idea I was an addict until I came to ASAC. I thought I could stop any time. I realized it was a problem when I wanted to stop and I couldn't."

Her Chance for Change

The Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) raided her house and found drug paraphernalia. Lindsay remembers that day in detail. "I didn't cry because I didn't like what I was doing. I was putting my kids through such a chaotic life." A week later, the Department of Human Services removed Lindsay's children, six-year-old Nevaeh and three-year-old Ryder, from her care after she admitted drug use.

From there, Lindsay heard about Heart of Iowa from her sister. Within six weeks, she had a place in the program. "It was hard the first couple of weeks. But that time allowed me to adjust to the schedule, routine, and big transition before bringing in my kids."

Sharing Newfound Hope

Lindsay completed the required 90-day program and chose to stay at ASAC Heart of lowa's halfway house. She works full-time, attends church and group meetings, and has dance parties with Nevaeh and Ryder in their living room.

She is proud of the person and mother she has become.

"My motivation is to be healthy, have a happy life with my kids, and give back to others who maybe don't understand addiction, or who need help but don't know where to go. I'd like to be an advocate for them and a voice for the disease of addiction to give hope to others. Because when you're in the disease of addiction, you feel hopeless, but as long as you're open-minded, you can make it out."


