Introduction

The Continuum of Care Planning and Policy Council administered the Individual & Family Needs Survey at local emergency shelters, transitional housing facilities, feeding sites, permanent housing sites, and homeless supportive services programs on July 26, 2017. The survey consisted of 19 questions that related to demographic and homeless issues. The majority of questions had check boxes for the respondents to select their answers. Additional space was provided in case respondents chose to write in their own answers. The following information reflects the compiled data from the survey.

• A total of 243 surveys were completed and returned. Based on the definitions provided below, 83 survey respondents could be considered "homeless," 157 as "near-homeless," and 3 did not respond.

Definitions

Homeless – are respondents who are currently living in an emergency shelter, transitional housing, motel/hotel, or on the street.

Near-Homeless – are respondents who reported currently living in their own place or someone else's place.

N = total sample.

n = sub-sample of total.

Note: Figures do not always equal 100% due to "no responses" or items where respondents could choose more than one answer.

Demographics and Background Information

A series of questions were asked of respondents to capture their demographics and background information.

FIGURE 1: Age

- The average age of all respondents was approximately 44 years.

FIGURE 2: Gender

- Of the 243 survey respondents, 139 identified as female and 101 identified as male and 3 did not respond.
- Of those surveyed, a greater percentage of women were both homeless and near-homeless.





FIGURE 3: Race/Ethnicity

- The majority of **homeless** respondents **(60%)** and **near-homeless** respondents **(71%)** are Caucasian.
- The percentage of **homeless** respondents **(30%)** and **near-homeless** respondents **(21%)** that are African American is disproportionately high considering the percentage of the African American population in Linn County **(4%)**¹.






FIGURE 5: Household Composition of Homeless & Near-Homeless Population by Race & Gender of households with children

- Of the **homeless** populations with children, 41% of respondent households were black females.
- Of the **near-homeless** populations with children, 53% of respondent households were white females.

Number of Near-Homeless Households with children, by race, gender of respondent & current housing situation





FIGURE 8: Educational Achievement


- **72% of homeless and 70% of Near-homeless individuals** have not obtained an education beyond a high school diploma or GED.

FIGURE 9: Disabilities/Health Issues

- **65%** of homeless and **69%** of near-homeless individuals reported having a disability or health issue.
 - The most prominent issues identified by the homeless population were mental health issues (35%) and physical/ medical disability (22%).
 - The most prominent issues identified by the near-homeless population were mental health issues (28%) and physical/medical disabilities (22%).




*Other Noted Health Concerns included: COPD, ADHD, cancer (3), heart failure, high blood pressure (2), gout, tendonitis, ulcers, disc problems in back, eye concerns, and overactive bladder.


- Those indicating military service represent 12% of all responding homeless and near-homeless individuals.

- 19% of homeless respondents reported being criminally convicted in the last year.





FIGURE 12: Current Living Situation


- The current living situation for most **homeless** respondents **(76%)** is an emergency shelter or transitional housing.
- Most near-homeless respondents (71%) indicated that they live in their own place.

FIGURE 13: Estimated Total Monthly Income


- Of the homeless population who reported their total monthly income, 88% have a total income of \$1,500 or less.
- Of the near-homeless population who reported their total monthly income, 79% have a total income of \$1,500 or less.
- One in three homeless respondents had no income.

FIGURE 14: Employment Status

- 77% of the homeless respondents and 55% of the near-homeless respondents were unemployed.
- Of the homeless respondents, 12% were working full-time; 8% worked part-time; and 4% had temporary employment.
- Of the near-homeless respondents, 24% were working full-time; 17% worked part-time; and 2% had temporary employment.



FIGURE 15: Primary Sources of Income

- Of homeless respondents, 31% utilized food assistance; 27% reported having Medicaid; and 11% of homeless respondents reported having SSI/ SSDI.
- Of the near-homeless respondents, 24% reported having Medicaid; 19% utilized food assistance; and 12% of near-homeless respondents reported having SSI/ SSDI and Medicare.



FIGURE 16: Greatest General Needs

Note: Respondents were asked to indicate their three highest needs at that time.

- The four greatest needs of homeless respondents include 1) affordable housing (30%), 2) food (13%), 3) transportation (12%) and 4) clothes (10%).
- The four greatest needs of the near-homeless respondents include 1) affordable housing (20%) and food (20%) 2) clothes (15%) and 3) transportation (13%)
- Affordable housing, transportation, clothes, and food are consistent primary needs among the homeless and near-homeless population.




Other Noted Needs: Pet food, financial assistance for bed bug eradication, help with disability paperwork, nurse for bathing assistance, and toiletries.

The highest-ranking needs for both homeless and near-homeless were 1) dental care, 2) eye care, 3) mental health care, and 4) family doctor.





FIGURE 18: Reason for Homelessness


Note: Respondents could select more than one answer

- The most prominent cause/reason for homelessness among the homeless respondents was poor credit/ debt (10%), low income, lack of deposit, family issues, and mental health issues (9% for each).
- The most prominent cause/reason for homelessness among the near-homeless respondents was poor credit/debt and income too low to obtain housing (12%), followed by lack of deposit and job loss (11%).

Top 8 Reasons for Homelessness by Homeless/ Near-homeless & Gender





FIGURE 19: Number of Times Homeless or Displaced in the Past Three Years



- Women were more likely than men, for both homeless and near-homeless respondents, to have been evicted in the past.






FIGURE 22 & 23: Have you ever had to leave your home because your landlord wouldn't fix things and your place was getting run down?

 27% of homeless and 24% of near-homeless respondents indicated having to leave their home because of poor housing quality conditions.



 Women identifying as homeless were more likely than men to have experienced issues with housing quality that forced them to leave their housing. There was no significant difference in the percent of men versus women experiencing this issue.
