WORKING TOGETHER IN CRISIS

Linn Area Partners Active in Disaster (LAP-AID) is our local Community Organizations Active in Disasters (COAD).



This group is made up of

more than 40 health and human service providers and other key organizations seeking to build a better-prepared and more reslient Linn County and East Central Iowa.

A large part of the work this group takes on often comes before disaster strikes - the preparedness stage. LAP-AID is a key member of drills hosted by the Linn County Emergency Management Agency (EMA) and other governmental agencies, ensuring our organizations are prepared when faced with a disaster.

In the instance of the 2020 derecho, LAP-AID met daily for months to coordinate a unified response to local needs

and became a central hub for connecting residents to vital resources.

PARTNERSHIP IN ACTION

When the 2020 derecho tore through our community, UWECI worked with several partner agencies and municipalities to implement a program to help with home repairs following the disaster.

The Providing Assistance to Community Homeowners (PATCH) program formed as a coalition of community partners and provided critical home repair and financial assistance to those affected by the storm. Through this program, a total of

\$3,442,000 was distributed to help homeowners recover. Funding was made possible by the Greater Cedar Rapids Community Foundation, City of Cedar Rapids, Linn County, and UWECI.



PATCH was a nearly four-year

long program that restored 292 households. As the program has officially come to an end in 2025, its legacy remains - a testament to what's possible when a community comes together in the face of adversity.
